
Introduction and Background



- What is the trend of crossings from 2010-2020







- The Texas-Mexico border is mountainous towards the western area and it is flatter in the more southern area
- Most Truck crossings occur at Laredo
- Most personnel crossings occur at El Paso and other road crossings
- Crossings rarely occur in the mountains





Personnel traffic seems to have increased over the years and it is mostly concentrated at road border crossings (mostly El Paso) while truck traffic has decreased over the years and is mostly concentrated at the Laredo crossing. Crossings rarely occur in mountainous areas.
